Rector's Reflections

Saints and Stewardship

The second line of our Parish Mission Statement proclaims Grace Church is “*a school for discipleship and stewardship...*” October is a month to celebrate this mission as the season of the Saints converges with our annual pledge drive and financial commitment to Grace Church.

In addition to four Sundays, we have three major feast days in October: St. Luke, St. James, Saints Simon and Jude; and a number of “lesser feasts,” including commemorations for St. Francis, St. Teresa, the Oxford Martyrs and St. Ignatius. The season of the Saints is highlighted by All Saints’ Eve (All Hallows’ Eve = Halloween), All Saints’ Day (November 1) and All Saints’ Sunday (November 4).

Our Stewardship Committee will ask us to return our financial pledge cards for 2013 on All Saints’ Sunday. During Sunday liturgies in October, parish leaders will make brief presentations focused upon this year’s theme: “Share God’s Gifts and in All Things Give Thanks.” The Saints are remembered for sharing God’s gifts and living lives of thanksgiving. The Saints teach us about discipleship and stewardship.

Our financial gifts to Grace Church are signs of thanksgivings and the way we can share God’s gifts. Our money, our “treasure,” freely and joyfully given for the ministry and mission of the Church, is combined with the sharing of our time and talents. We have so many talented parishioners sharing so much of their time with us. Our pledges reflect this same generosity and sacrifice.

In October of 1977, I was preparing to run my first marathon in New York City. I also was serving at St. Mary’s Church in High Point, NC, as a young Assistant ordained just four months. Our Stewardship campaign was beginning, and I began preparing to preach on one of the lessons appointed for All Saints’ (Hebrews 11:32–12:2). From these verses we have the Eucharistic Preface for All Saints, “*in the multitude of your saints you have surrounded us with a great cloud of witnesses, that we might rejoice in their fellowship, and run with endurance the race that is set before us...*” (BCP, p. 380).

Thirty-five years later I’m still running and rejoicing. We are all “runners” in our shared life of discipleship and stewardship at Grace Church. May we continue to look to Jesus, “*the pioneer and perfecter of our faith,*” in this season of all the saints.

Graceful Worship: The Ministry of Healing

Prayers for Healing, including the laying on of hands and anointing with oil, follow each Grace Church morning service on the third Sunday of each month, and every Tuesday at 6:30 pm. Members of our clergy also visit parishioners who are sick in mind, body, or spirit, in their homes or in hospital, in order to offer laying on of hands, anointing and prayers. And every week's Prayer List invites us all to pray for fellow parishioners, and family and friends who need healing of some kind. If you have never participated in this ministry you may wonder what it's all about.

God the Father gave Jesus, his Son, the power of healing: "God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Ghost and with power: who went about doing good, and healing all that were oppressed of the devil; for God was with him" (Acts 10:38). Jesus, in turn, gave his twelve disciples the power to heal: "they will place their hands on sick people, and they will get well" (Mark 16:18).

Oil was commonly used as a healing agent in biblical times. Laying hands on the sick for the purpose of healing and anointing a sick person with oil became a common practice in the early Christian Church. These were symbolic reminders of the healing power of the Holy Spirit and an encouragement to faith. It was common for a sick Christian to call for the elders of the church: "Is anyone among you sick? Let him call for the elders of the church, and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord" (James 5:14). Over time the elders became bishops and priests, and the healing ministry became one of their pastoral responsibilities.

The Guild of St. Raphael, founded in 1915 and originating within the Anglican Communion, is an organization dedicated to promoting, supporting and practicing Christ's ministry of healing as an integral part of the life and worship of the Church. It expanded to include members from other Churches, and is now both ecumenical in outlook and international in scope.

Starting on page 845 in the back of our *Book of Common Prayer* (BCP) is a section called "An Outline of the Faith," also known as the Catechism. In question-and-answer format it summarizes Episcopal beliefs and practices. On page 861 it asks, "What is Unction of the Sick?" and answers "Unction is the rite of anointing the sick with oil, or the laying on of hands, by which God's grace is given for the healing of spirit, mind, and body." If you look further in our BCP you will find other rites and prayers that focus on healing. The pastoral office entitled "Ministration to the Sick" (page 453) can be used in either a corporate or private setting. Collects for the feast days of St. Mary Magdalene (page 191) and St. Luke (page 193), and a general collect For the Sick (page 260), focus on the healing power of the Holy Spirit. A variety of prayers for the sick can be found on pages 458-461.

Although the laying on of hands and anointing with oil is most commonly performed by a priest, healing prayer can be offered by anyone, anywhere, at any time, merely by asking, "May I pray for you?" Sometimes the mere act of asking that question can make a big difference to the person for whom you will pray.
