Rector's Reflections

## New Life in Easter

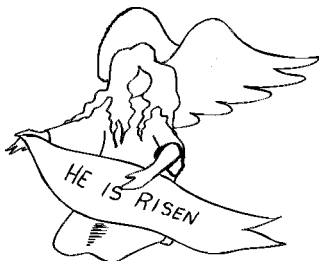
The name "Easter" comes to us from the Old English dialect's use of an Ancient pagan goddess, "Eostre" who was celebrated every April. She was known as the one who brings light at the dawn of springtime days. Early Christian believers, celebrating the new light and new life in Jesus' Resurrection, transformed this English pagan spring festival to mark the Paschal mystery of Christ's risen glory.

Easter Day begins the 50-day Easter season, which continues until Pentecost on May 24. During these 50 days we celebrate the new light and new life of Christ's victory over evil, suffering and death. New light certainly comes as the days grow longer. I wonder what new "light" might come in our ability to see differently? To understand in a new way? To communicate with clarity and honesty?

It took the disciples weeks, years to understand Jesus' passion and glory. The gospel stories were not written down for decades. The Church formed from faith communities after centuries of persecution and oppression. Living by the light of Christ's resurrection takes time.

New life comes every spring, eagerly expected after a long, cold winter. New life comes as children are born and begin the journey of life. We see many life transitions every Easter season: baptisms, confirmations, marriages, graduations. Some change jobs. Some move into retirement. Some in this season will experience new life after physical death.

Easter gives us meaning for all these changes—for new light and new life. Celebrate the day, the season, the life. Remember Jesus' words before his Ascension, "I am with you always..."

## From the Assistant to the Rector

A tremendous opportunity to minister to our neighborhood has begun at Grace Church. This spring, along with the crocuses and daffodils, a new bud of hope and opportunity is growing at Grace. Beginning April 15 and each following Tuesday night for nine weeks, we will welcome folk to our church for English as a Second Language (ESL) classes.

Katy Baytosh, the wife of the Head of School at Alexandria Country Day School, has many years’ experience teaching ESL in the US and overseas. She has trained at Harvard and received her M.A. in teaching ESL from West Virginia University. She has taught ESL and trained ESL teachers all over the country and in Ecuador. Ms. Baytosh has a passion for her work and for the people she serves.

This amazingly gifted woman walked through our doors and asked if we would like to partner with her in getting an ESL course established at Grace Church. Ms. Baytosh shops at Foodway from time to time to get Latin American foods and had noticed our church next door. She struck up conversations with some of the workers there and also at Mom’s Organic Grocery Store. She learned there were no ESL programs within walking distance of Chirilagua/Arlandria. She thought we’d be the perfect location to start this ministry to these neighbors.

We have volunteer teachers trained and ready to begin: Lisa Bellantoni, Paul Bellantoni, Chuck Dodd, Mary Fox, Jona Gilliam, Kendra Janevski and Jan Spence have stepped forward to lend their talents to the ESL classes. I give thanks to God for their heart for this new ministry! We’ll see what blooms from the seeds we sow this month. Please keep this program, teachers and students in your prayers.

## A Word from Mother Elizabeth on "Resurrection Life"

Of all the parts of the Church Year, the part that seems most in sync with the seasons of the natural world—in the Northern Hemisphere at least—is Easter. It doesn't take too much in the way of mental gymnastics to think about resurrection life when the whole world around you seems to be resurrecting with the spring.

New animals are being born, eggs are hatching, and the trees that have seemed so long-dead during the winter are suddenly putting forth green leaves again. Life seems to be returning to the world just as we start our celebration of Jesus returning to life from the tomb.

In what ways might your own life be experiencing or preparing for resurrection in this season? What new chance, or new growth, or new life experience might be preparing to bud and flower? Or what resurrection would you like to be experiencing?

Lent is coming to a close, a season when we are called to examine ourselves and perhaps prepare for renewal. So now, as we celebrate the way that God renewed life not just in His Son but in all the world, we can pray, watch and hope for renewal in our own selves. ## Holy Week and Easter Music



During Holy Week, please join us for the Service of Choral Tenebrae at 7:30 pm on Wednesday, April 1. On Good Friday, there will be a small representation from the Adult Choir to lead the congregational hymn singing. In keeping with an ancient tradition of the Church, the organ will remain silent from the final hymn on Maundy Thursday until the First Mass of Easter on Easter Eve. This means that the hymns sung on Good Friday will be done *a cappella*. The renewed sounding of the organ with full force at the Great Vigil of Easter will be dramatic as a result. We will have a brass quintet and timpani on Easter morning at both the 9 am and 11:15 am liturgies, with the usual *Hallelujah Chorus* at the end of each service. The Boys and Girls Choir will sing at 9 am Easter morning.

Holy Week and Easter are perhaps the most musically rich times of the liturgical year. But to provide for special instrumental music at Easter, we rely solely on the Music Fund—not on the church budget. The total sum of our Easter morning brass and timpani will cost \$2,650. If having brass is meaningful to you and you are able, please consider making a donation of *any amount* to the Music Fund to help defray this cost. I bid you all a holy Lent and a most joyful Easter.

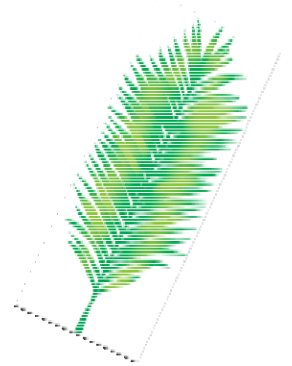

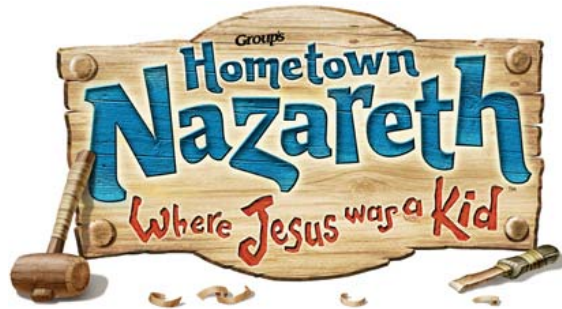
# Announcements for Children and Youth

## The Easter Vigil

The Saturday before Easter, known as Holy Saturday or Easter Eve, is drawing to a close. In the early church it was a day of fasting and preparation, and some of us still observe this practice. The church is no longer bare, but is now adorned with lilies and other plants with white flowers as symbols of new life and purity. The crosses are no longer veiled. The sun has gone down, the “day” has ended, and it is time for the liturgy of the Easter Vigil (BCP pp. 284-95), also known as the “Great Vigil.” This is the first and, in the opinion of many, the primary celebration of Easter. The service begins sometime between sunset on Holy Saturday and sunrise on Easter. At Grace Church we celebrate the Easter Vigil at 8 pm. Some Protestant churches hold a sunrise worship service.

Our Easter Vigil consists of four parts. First, the “Service of Light” begins. The bishop, when present, is the chief celebrant. Like the Resurrection of Christ, which it celebrates, the Easter Vigil



begins in the darkness of night. While the church is in darkness, the celebrant lights the “new fire” (probably a custom of Celtic origin), symbolizing our desire to “drive away all Darkness” and attain “everlasting light.” The Paschal candle, which will be burning during all worship services through Pentecost, is lit from this fire. It is given to the deacon, if one is present, whose prerogative it is to process with it, light the candles of the congregation, and to sing or say the *Exsultet*: “Rejoice now, heavenly hosts and choirs of angels, and let your trumpets shout Salvation for the victory of our mighty King.”

The Liturgy of the Word comes next, consisting of nine readings from the Old Testament interspersed with psalms, canticles and prayers. The readings recount familiar stories of salvation, called “God’s saving deeds in history,” that we look forward to hearing every year.

- The story of creation (Genesis 1:1—2:2)
- The flood (Genesis 7:1-5, 11-18, 8:6-18, 9:8-13)
- Abraham’s sacrifice of Isaac (Genesis 22:1-18)
- Israel’s deliverance at the Red Sea (Exodus 14:10—15:1)
- God’s presence in a renewed Israel (Isaiah 4:2-6)
- Salvation offered freely to all (Isaiah 55:1-11)
- A new heart and a new spirit (Ezekiel 36:12-28)
- The valley of dry bones (Ezekiel 37:1-14)
- The gathering of God’s people (Zephaniah 3:12-20)

It is customary that a different lay person reads each Lesson, and all priests who are present share among them the reading of the Collects which follow each Lesson.

Easter was the primary time for baptism in the early church, to the practical exclusion of all others. This directly linked the meaning of Christ's dying and rising to our understanding of baptism. Although we now baptize at other times of the year, our first official act of the Easter liturgy is to witness the baptism of any candidates that are present, and receive the newly-baptized into the "household of God." In the absence of any candidates, we all renew our Baptismal Covenant and say, "we are buried with Christ in his death," and "by it we share in his resurrection."

Last, but certainly not least, we celebrate the Eucharist—the first Eucharist of Easter. It begins with the first exclamatory "Alleluia" since the beginning of Lent. The celebrant, in a loud voice, exclaims "Alleluia! Christ is risen." We respond, "The Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia!" After the Cantic (usually the *Gloria in Excelsis*), the Collect and the reading of the Gospel (Matthew 28:1-10), the celebrant preaches the sermon. We omit the Nicene Creed because we have already recited the Apostles Creed as part of the baptismal portion of the liturgy. And the rest of the Eucharist proceeds.

At Grace Church, our celebration of the Great Vigil is usually followed by an "*agape* feast," from the Greek word for selfless, sacrificial, unconditional love (the highest of the four types of love in the Bible), and the kind of love perfected in Jesus Christ's sacrifice for us. We are reminded of his instruction: "Whoever has my commands and keeps them is the one who loves me. The one who loves me will be loved by my Father, and I too will love them and show myself to them." (John 14:21). And so we continue the celebration as we share the feast with each other, in community and with great joy.

If you would like a receipt for your taxes, write your name and email address on the reverse of the yellow slip and you will receive an email acknowledgement of your donation. If you have many books to donate, note the number of books you are donating on one yellow slip along with your name and email address. If you want to know if the library already has a copy of the book you are donating, check the book catalog that is on the circulation desk. If you donate a book that we already have or we feel it is not appropriate for our shelves, we can return it to you, if you let us know that is what you want us to do. If you give us no instructions, we will save the duplicate books for our next book swap/giveaway.

You can also donate to the library by check; write on the memo line "for the library budget." We will use the money to buy more books.
