Rector's Reflections

"Rich Toward God"

We have had a glorious Easter season and a wonderful start to the Pentecost season here at Grace Church. I'm writing just after our celebration of Ascension Day with our Music Director, Richard Newman, and the choir leading us in a beautiful Evensong combined with Holy Communion. The organ and choir have never sounded this good!

A short time ago we had a marvelous auction, dinner and joy-filled evening to help raise more than \$12,000 to help our teenagers go on their pilgrimage to Germany this summer. It was so good to see this large J2A (Journey to Adulthood) class confirmed by the Bishop at the Easter Vigil.

We have celebrated marriages and baptisms. We have given thanks for our loved ones who have died. In May, we began to celebrate Chris Byrnes' retirement as Head of School. I'm so glad we can dedicate the amphitheater to Chris in thanksgiving for her 11 years of outstanding leadership.

I was able to spend four days in retreat at the Society of St. John the Evangelist (SSJE) in Cambridge, Massachusetts. The monastery and guest house are places of prayer and the "beauty of holiness." For 35 years the ministry of SSJE has fed and refreshed my soul and my spiritual journey.

All of this reminds me of Jesus' encouragement to be "*rich toward God*." (See Luke 12:13-21). As we look forward to the beginning of summer, we can once again give thanks for all God's blessings and recommit ourselves to be faithful stewards of the resources we share.

What joy new parents feel as they welcome their infants into life! Mother Elizabeth and Ben Locher know this joy as they celebrate the first month of life for their daughter, Mary. Yet with this joy, with this rich new life, comes new work, new responsibilities.

So, too, our teenagers will discover new joys and new responsibilities as they continue their journey to adulthood, after their pilgrimage, and for our graduating high school seniors, after they leave home for college. With the riches God gives come joy and responsibility.

Jesus reminds us of this just a few verses after he asks us to be "*rich toward God*." "*To whom much has been given, much will be required*" (Luke 12:48). The weeks ahead will bring many opportunities for us to rejoice in God's gifts, and ask God for the wisdom and strength to use them well.

From the Assistant to the Rector

Pentecost is a time when we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit. Okay, I think many of us have this fine point down. If you are new to the Christian faith, maybe this is news to you! What I think may be news to everyone is that because of Pentecost, there really is no excuse. “No excuse?!” Yes, dear friends, you have read that correctly. There is no excuse.

“Not enough money” will not cut it. “Too busy” does not get you traction. “I don’t speak their language” is out the window when we are talking the Holy Spirit. Any reason for not getting in on the action is insufficient and a lie that has been fed to you. THERE. IS. NO. EXCUSE. We have an Advocate, a presence, a helper, who is ready to guide us and equip us with everything we will need to do mission. Mission is us participating in God’s work of spreading the love of Jesus Christ throughout this broken and suffering world. It is our turn to take up the work of the Apostles and witness in our own times. Because of the Holy Spirit, we will have the words, the energy, the authority, and the people to get the job done. You are empowered through the Spirit to do IT. I think that is about all you need to know, except perhaps the *what?* it is that you will be doing.

What? is a good question. I am writing this article to you in part as a response to the timely commencement address given to the Virginia Seminary Class of 2015 by the Rt. Rev. Jeffrey D. Lee, the 12th Bishop of Chicago.¹ He spoke about what makes a congregation vital. In his many visitations as a bishop to all sorts of parishes in his diocese, both thriving and dying, he has noticed a pattern emerging: whatever style of parish, whether traditional, innovative, conservative, or liberal, thriving parishes all have three things in common. First, they are clear about *who they are*; second, they lead conversations in *things that matter*; and third, they have a *heart for Jesus*. In other words, they remember what it is that they fell in love with about the church; they remember why they fell in love; and they remember who it is they fell in love with and nurture that relationship.

Now, let’s get back to Pentecost and you. Grace Church hits all three of these marks of a healthy parish. That may be what attracted you to this particular Christian community. Grace Church is clear about its identity. We worship in the beauty of holiness. We value fellowship and community (we are friendly). We serve our neighbors and the world. THERE is the *what?* you are looking for. If you pray for the Holy Spirit to guide you, it may tell you your place is already prepared, that the door is already open, that your skills are already needed. The Spirit will tell you to dive into the waters of ministry in one of these three areas at Grace: worship, fellowship/education, or outreach/mission. I am certain of it! Listen to the Spirit. I am already praying for you. I and the other clergy, the Vestry, and the many ministry leaders are ready to get you plugged in. You can do this and there is no excuse not to – the Spirit is with you and supporting you in your desire to be a part of Grace Church and the epic and amazing journey we are on with Christ.

Pentecost: A Jewish Holiday?

Brad and I have been watching the television mini-series “A.D.” about the beginnings of Christianity, starting right after the crucifixion and resurrection. In a recent episode the disciples referred to something happening “after Pentecost.” Wait a minute – how can these Jews be referring to a Christian feast day?

I discovered that Pentecost actually was one of the Jewish feast days, but they didn't call it that, because that's the Greek name. The Jews called it the feast of Weeks. It's mentioned in the Old Testament and was the celebration of the beginning of the early weeks of harvest.



“Three times a year you shall celebrate a pilgrim feast to me ... You shall also keep the feast of the grain harvest with the first of the crop that you have sown in the field...” (Exodus 23:14-16)

“On the day of first fruits, on your feast of Weeks, when you present to the Lord the new cereal offering, you shall hold a sacred assembly, and do no sort of work.” (Numbers 28:26)

“You shall count off seven weeks, computing them from the day when the sickle is first put to the standing grain. You shall then keep the feast of Weeks in honor of the Lord, your God, and the measure of your own freewill offering shall be in proportion to the blessing the Lord, your God, has bestowed on you. In the place which the Lord, your God, chooses as the dwelling place of his name, you shall make merry in his presence, together with your son and daughter, your male and female slave, and the Levite who belongs to your community, as well as the alien, the orphan and the widow among you.” (Deuteronomy 16:9-11)

In ancient Israel there were two harvests each year. The early harvest came during the months of May and June, and the final harvest came in the fall. The feast of Weeks was the celebration of the beginning of the early wheat harvest, which meant that it fell sometime between the middle of May and early June.

There were several festivals, celebrations and observances that took place before the feast of Weeks. There was Passover; there was the feast of Unleavened Bread (seven days beginning with the end of Passover); and there was the feast of First Fruits (the day following the first day of Unleavened Bread, signifying the beginning of the barley harvest). To figure out the date of the feast of Weeks according to the Old Testament, you would go to the day of the celebration of First Fruits and, beginning with that day, you would count off 50 days. The fiftieth day would be the day of Weeks. So First Fruits is the beginning of the barley harvest and Weeks is the celebration of the beginning of the wheat harvest. Since it was always 50 days after First Fruits, and since 50 days equals seven weeks (more or less), it always came a "week of weeks" later. Therefore, they called it the feast of Weeks.

Three things help us understand the Acts 2:1 reference, “When the day of Pentecost came, it found them gathered in one place.” First, it was a pilgrim festival. According to Jewish law, all the adult Jewish men would come from wherever they were living to Jerusalem and personally be in attendance during this celebration. Second, it was a holiday, so no work was supposed to be done. Finally, there were specific offerings which were prescribed in the law for the feast. For example, the high priest was to take two loaves of freshly baked bread, made from newly-harvested wheat, and offer them before the Lord.

The Feast of Weeks, in the time of the Apostles, was a big celebration. The streets of Jerusalem were clogged with thousands of pilgrims who came from every point of the compass to celebrate the goodness of God and the bringing in of the wheat harvest. It was a perfect time for the Holy Spirit to descend upon “Jews of every nation in heaven” (Acts 2:5).

Haiti Micah Project Sponsorship

“Greater love hath no man than this – that he lay down his life for his friend.”

In her sermon on April 26th, Mother Locher shared her story of being so moved by this verse at a very young age that she took it upon herself, immediately. She went on to tell us about Fr. Maximillian Kolbe, a Franciscan Priest, who ministered to and shared his meager rations and finally gave his life for a fellow Auschwitz prisoner.

“We know love by this, that he laid down his life for us – and we ought to lay down our lives for one another.”

In our age and our place, the call to give to one another does not require that we give up our lives or “our meager” rations for one another, but that doesn’t let us off the hook. We, like Jesus, like the Apostles, like so many through the ages, are just as powerfully called to love and care for one another.

We thank each of you who have felt the call to love and care for the children of the Haiti Micah Project (HMP). Your continued sponsorships ensure food, clothing and a really good education for the Haiti Micah children for another year. The cost of this remains \$300 per child. If you are not yet a sponsor, perhaps this is your year, or perhaps you feel called to sponsor a second child, as the tragedy of Haiti is that there are always more children to save. We thank you for considering this ministry, and know that if you choose to sponsor a child you will come to be as grateful for the work of the HMP as we are. Saving a child is no small matter.

Becoming a sponsor is easy. There is an HMP poster in the Tower Lobby with directions for sponsoring a child, or children, and an envelope for your check. The sponsorship for one child for an entire year is \$300, but you may break up these payments as you choose. You may also share sponsorship with a friend or friends. Please just make sure we have the details so that we can include you (and friends) on our list. The check may be mailed to Grace, dropped off in the office or placed in the offering.

Flames of Pentecost

Flames of Pentecost is the title of an artwork recently donated to Grace Church by parishioner Barbara Morris. “It’s definitely a mixed media,” says Barbara who, since moving to Goodwin House Bailey’s Crossroads, has studied watercolor and paints mostly abstracts. “It’s a collage of curved scraps of paper that have been colored with pencil, watercolor and ink.” *Flames of Pentecost* started out as an abstract mountain forest. That failed, and it became a storm at sea. Another failure. Barbara was about to fling it into the recycle bin when she recalled her teacher’s admonition: Never throw anything away. Keep at it even if you wind up with a small, simple design for a notecard. While she pondered what to do next, Barbara doodled with watercolor brushes, pen and colored pencils. She found herself scrawling large circles, over and over until she had a huge multicolor circle. Continuing to experiment, she began to cut, following the strokes of pen and brush—and wound up with curved shapes, like quarter moons. They were mostly red and reminded her of fire, and with that came the idea of Pentecostal flames. She arranged the collage, glued the scraps to the paper (but with some edges left free) and added small circles to represent the triune God. Out of failures emerged a work that satisfied her artistic sense and the desire to share it with others. Barbara is extremely pleased that her offering was accepted to be hung in the second floor lobby outside the St. Mark room.

After reading prayers outside the tower lobby, the group processed along the sidewalk to the sanctuary singing hymns and carrying pictures and mementos of Mary. From the Parish Library

Remember to check the Parish Library for your summer reading material. We have many “light” books in our fiction section that would be perfect for vacation reading. Or, if you prefer to use the summer to dig into deep theological discourses, we have books for that too. If you need to keep a book for more than the usual four weeks, please make a note on the book card when you check-out the book, including the anticipated return date if you know it.

Three books for deep reading are:

1. *The Philosophy of Jesus* by Peter Kreeft (232.9/KRE)
The author discusses Jesus’ ethics, why it is necessary to pray, how we should live, that Jesus is “goodness” and that he is the answer to “What is the meaning of life?” He says that Saints are “little Christs” and we should try to be “little Christs,” too.
2. *The Dark Night of the Soul* by St. John of the Cross (248/GRA)
St. John describes the process of a man’s soul moving through the “dark night” into the union with God’s love. He uses his own experience and examples from the Bible, the stories of David, Job, Jonah and Jeremiah, to show how to make this journey. The first part of the journey is prayer and contemplation and the last part is a gift from God.
3. *Revelations of Divine Love* by Julian of Norwich (242/JUL)
Written in 1373, this is the first book ever written in English by a woman. Julian relates the 16 “showings” or visions she received that form her belief in the encompassing love that God has for all humanity. She calls Jesus “Mother” and speaks about a “great deed” that will open for us the explanation of why bad things happen.

Three books for light reading are:

1. *Sunday The Rabbi Stayed Home* by Harry Kemelman (PB/K)
Rabbi David Small is a detective involved in murder, marijuana and militants.
2. *I Heard The Owl Call My Name* by Margaret Craven (PB/C)
This novel is about Mark Brian, a young Anglican priest, who is dying and goes to serve an Indian village in British Columbia.
3. *The Pastor’s Appreciation Book of Wit and Wisdom* by Douglas Brouwer (PB/B)
Some wise and witty sayings for church members.
