Rector's Reflections

The Grand Miracle

C.S. Lewis calls the Incarnation of Jesus Christ "The Grand Miracle." "Every other miracle prepares for this or exhibits this, or results from this." * The birth of Jesus, the Incarnation, this annual celebration we call Christmas points to the mystery, the grace, the truth that God comes to us through all time and space and becomes one of us, to teach us about love.

We sing about his Grand Miracle in our carols for Christmas. I try not to listen to much Christmas music until the last week before Christmas. Advent is a full four-week season this year since Christmas Day falls on a Sunday. The "second birth" we sing about in "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing," reminds us that in celebrating Jesus' birth, we can also celebrate our birth—birth into God's love, God's truth, God's grace, God's light.

Christmas is a season for new birth. The new presents we share are symbols of the new life possible within us. What needs birth in our lives, in our world? How do we participate in this new life, this new birth? What are the pains, the challenges, the responsibilities, the joys of new birth?

At Grace Church, Christmas is a full season, more than 12 days this year since we are celebrating Epiphany on the 6th with our traditional bilingual Eucharist on Sunday, January 8, at 9:00 a.m. The visit of the three "Wise Men" marks the end of the liturgical celebrations for Christmas.

Yet there is no end to God's invitation. God, through Christ, continually calls us to new birth; to live into the Grand Miracle; to see all miracles of birth related to this miracle of birth we celebrate every year.

Our staff wishes you a Blessed Christmas and a Holy New Year.

From the Assistant to the Rector

I am always humbled when I think of the many ways that Grace Church has blessed the community that surrounds it and blessed lives around the world. Thank you to all who supported the Thanksgiving Basket Drive. You have touched hundreds of lives with your generosity and love.

This Christmas, Mission and Outreach is trying a new venture by giving through the City of Alexandria, Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS). DHHS has the names of hundreds of families in economic crisis this Christmas season. They put out a plea for churches and businesses to "adopt" families to buy presents for this Christmas. We will be receiving names, ages and requests from children and adults for three neighbor families. We will put up a Christmas tree with "angels" on it: paper tags with an age and gift request written on each. I hope you and your family will take an angel or two and shop for the gift, wrap it up in pretty paper, and place it under the tree. We will deliver the presents after December 18, the Fourth Sunday of Advent.

In the first two weeks of Advent, I will be on a pilgrimage to the Holy Land. I will be visiting the site of our Lord's birth in Bethlehem. As I travel, I will be thinking of those events long ago and what it means to our community at Grace Church. These two places are linked over space and time by the power of the Gospel. Our lives are touched by the witness of the millions of Christians who have come before us—how the incarnation has transformed a season of darkness into one of light and hope.

I pray this season is once again filled with light and hope. There has been so much darkness this past year—but the darkness has not and shall not overcome the light. In this time of fear and nervousness, let the image of that manger in a cave and a vulnerable little baby give you strength and peace. For God so loved the world...

From the library

I am writing this as the newest member of the parish library team. I love to read. I read just about anything—history, biographies, novels, and mysteries. Wherever I go, I bring a book with me just in case I have a few spare minutes. For the past several years, I also have been listening to recorded books, first on tape and more recently on DVD. I have more books than I can count at home and I am a regular public library patron.



One significant gap in my reading, however, has been religion and theology.

When Wendy Cummings asked me to assume her duties in the parish library, I came face to face with the fact that I had been missing out on a wealth of really interesting subjects. I knew, of course, that the parish had a library, but I had never really looked closely at the book collection itself. I quickly discovered that about half the collection consists of weighty reference material for the serious theological student and for the clergy, not necessarily for me. However, I found that over half of the material is quite readable for me and therefore for the general parish. We have books about the Episcopal Church and the wider church. Our collection includes the histories of Christianity and biographies of the Saints. We have comparative religion books, too. If you have ever wanted to know more about Judaism or Islam, for example, we have the books you need. We cover a wide range of topics—angels, Christian education, stewardship, and worship. Want something else? We have religious novels and medieval mysteries. The library shelves also contain a number of human psychology and self-help books covering such topics as caregiving, death, grief, parenting and counseling. We also have a growing selection of DVDs of classic and modern movies and lecture series as well.

We add to our collection every year to keep current with popular or otherwise important books that may interest parish members. In this regard, I would welcome your suggestions if there are particular topics or specific books you would like to see in our collection. We are also fortunate to receive donations of used books from parishioners who want to share their reading experiences with the rest of us.

I plan to broaden my reading in 2017 to include as many of these materials as I can. I urge you all to browse the shelves. The library is centrally located, checkout is easy and the time you can keep a book is flexible (no late fees or fines). If you like to read, the library probably has something for you.

A Different Approach to Advent

By the time you receive this newsletter, the "holiday season" will be in full swing. Virtually every retail establishment will display some version of holiday decoration. Many of them will advertise *CHRISTMAS SALE/25% OFF!* or something of the sort. Christmas music will be on the radio, non-stop on a few stations. The mad rush will have begun to purchase and wrap Christmas gifts and send them by mail to far-away loved ones; to select, write and mail Christmas cards; to make plans for traveling to visit family; to decide just whom to invite to Christmas dinner... you can fill in the rest. I get exhausted just writing about it.

By the way, Advent has just started (on November 27, in case you missed it). For many of us, Advent seems to get pushed to the side by the worldliness of the holiday season. If we would like it to be different this year, there's time to try a different approach to Advent. It doesn't require us to stop doing all the other things—although slowing down, reducing "to-do lists," and taking the occasional deep breath would benefit us all. Instead, it suggests that we change our focus a little.

The word "advent" is from the Latin for "coming," and it refers to the coming of the Christ child. Advent is a time of preparation—not for the holiday spectacle, but for the almost-incredible appearance of God on earth, in human form. Advent is a time of watching, waiting, anticipating. If we want to participate in this more fully, there are several ways we might do it, as individuals or with our family members.

- We can wait to "start Christmas." When do we normally set up our Christmas tree and decorations? Do we set them up during Advent, or wait until Christmas? We might consider delaying the Christmas decorations until the end of Advent. We are often so quick to rush from season to season that we miss the blessings of the actual moment we are in.
- We can worship often. We can make a special effort to be present each Sunday during Advent. When there are additional worship services (such as Advent Lessons and Carols), we might try to attend so that we can worship in different ways. We might even stretch so far as to add one of the "dailies" to our schedule during Advent. (Warning, this can be addictive.)
- We can say an Advent prayer every day. This can replace our usual grace-at-mealtime, be included in nightly prayer, or be said at another chosen time. The Advent Collects in our *Book of Common Prayer* (pp. 159-160 or pp. 211-212) are one possibility.
- Another option for us is to read different parts of the Advent and Christmas stories, and different versions in different chapters of our Bible. Or we can check out a book about Advent from our church library. I found Advent: The Days Before Christmas, by Paul Lindberg and Advent-Worship and Activities for Families, by Margaret Huffman.
- We can make an Advent wreath for our home. There should be four candles on the wreath, each representing one week of Advent. We should place it in a visible spot where the family gathers. Light it during evening prayer or at meal times. Light one candle the first week, two the second week, etc.

- We can listen to sacred music. Pick up some CDs or download Advent music and play it on the way to work or school, or during the drive home, or during dinner. If we like to sing, we can ask our Music Director if we might join the choir during Advent.
- Can we consider confession? We might read Reconciliation of a Penitent, (BCP pp. 447-452). It's not as scary as we thought? We can give it a try when it is offered during Advent. It's a wonderful way to feel "clean clear through" in preparation for Christmas.
- We can think less about ourselves and more about the others around us. The holidays are a hungry and/or lonely time for a lot of people. Are there people in our neighborhood, church, or other parts of our lives that don't have family around to celebrate with? We can reach out and see if they want to join our family dinner. We can offer to visit nursing homes or shut-ins during Advent, or volunteer to deliver Meals-on-Wheels, or make sandwiches for the Brown Bag Lunch Program. We can become someone's "secret Santa."

These are just a few suggestions. If we plan to try one, start with good enthusiasm, and then neglect (or forget) to follow through, we should be kind to ourselves. We're not perfect. Our plans and good intentions sometimes give way to the reality of schedules and obligations. Fear not! Christ comes to us, whether we prepare for Him or we don't.

You are invited to join us for Advent Lessons and Carols on December 4 at 5:00 p.m. Highlights include two movements from Handel's *Messiah* and the ever popular, "E'en so Lord Jesus," by Paul Manz. The composer wrote this intensely moving piece in 1953, at a time when his three-year-old son was critically ill. Of all the pieces the choir will sing during the service, Manz's text from Revelation encapsulates the whole Advent journey from darkness into light. Works by Elgar, Stanford, and "The Midnight Cry," from The Southern Harmony fill out the rest of the service. The Holy Eucharist will be celebrated immediately following the closing voluntary.

The holidays are always rich with music and we are blessed to have hard-working choirs to offer the music to the greater glory of God. Aside from the various services with special music and instrumentalists on Christmas Eve, we will have music for strings, choir, and organ on the Feast of Candlemas, January 29 at 11:15 a.m.

Have you contributed to the Music Fund recently? The various instrumentalists at Christmas and other feast days are funded solely by the Music Fund, which is not part of the church's operating budget. United Nations Commission on the Status of Women

Our own Grace parishioner, Char Rusnak, has been selected by Presiding Bishop Curry to be one of twenty Episcopal delegates to the UN Commission on the Status of Women from March 13-24, 2017. This year the Priority Theme is Women's Economic Empowerment in the Changing World of Work. The Episcopal Church will focus on initiatives to: 1) increase access to education for women and girls; 2) support gender equality by working against gender-based violence and supporting socioeconomic benefits such as equal pay, childcare, maternity leave, and women in senior leadership, and; 3) program and finance projects supporting marginalized personnel including migrants, refugees, minorities and those with disabilities.

The Episcopal Church has non-voting delegates, so Char and the other delegates will be advocating the official Church position on these issues to the voting representatives of the member states and identifying ways the Episcopal Church (and Grace, Region IV, and the Diocese of Virginia) can support these goals. Since the delegation selections were recently announced, Char is just starting to learn about these positions and her role on the delegation. By the time she speaks at the Forum on February 5, she will have a little more to tell you. She is eager to hear your thoughts about how Grace may be able to support these initiatives. Attendance at the UN meeting is just part of her obligations; she is also responsible for communicating about the Commission and helping to support the priorities upon her return. Char is excited about the opportunity to help empower women and if you'd like to help support her and the UN efforts, she is holding fundraisers to cover program costs and travel expenses. Activities planned include a Happy Hour at Fiona's in Kingstowne, on Wednesday, November 30, 2016, from 5-8 p.m.; Paint it Forward on January 11, 2017, at Wine and Design on Belle View Blvd.; a dinner at Hard Times Cafe (TBD); and Char has started a "Go Fund Me" site.

Dear Grace Parishioners,

It is with a grateful heart that I thank Judy Willard and the Grace Outreach Committee for their generous \$2,000 donation toward Hurricane Matthew Relief in Haiti. The worst hit areas were in the southern "claw" and the breadbasket of Haiti. Virtually all buildings were leveled and those concrete buildings that still stand are being used as shelters, along with caves in the area. The agricultural economy has been decimated. Over 13,000 women are scheduled to give birth in the next 90 days. For much of the mountain areas, some people have still not been rescued or located.

Haiti Micah Project (HMP) is located in central Haiti. The children and staff are well, but the winds and rain destroyed our meager kitchen. In one month, HMP raised nearly \$46,000. Half of all donations will be given to Episcopal leaders in the southwestern area to distribute directly to the people. The other half of the donations will be used to build a new kitchen next to the vocational training center property and pay for the increase in food costs.

Hurricane Matthew has once again set back recovery for Haiti, which is still suffering from the effects of the 2010 earthquake. The country is beset with political instability, an inflated currency, and earlier food shortages from a drought. The hurricane has compounded the food shortage, since the planting season is in November and seeds and tools have been ruined.

Currently the cost of salt has tripled because the manufacturing plant was destroyed by the hurricane. The costs of other food are sure to follow. Mirebalais is seeing Haitians coming to the Central Plateau, where HMP is located, and if history repeats itself, they do not return to their former homes.

I have been asked by many: How can God allow such repeated devastation? Where is God for Haiti? As people of faith, we recognize the Spirit of Christ working through His people. Few can work directly with those needing life-saving support, but we can work to keep our hearts open and make our own contribution of prayers, monitoring the news, and financial contributions.

Thank you again for your continued response to the plight of the Haitian people.

During the Christmas season, bring your filled tote bags to the Food Pantry and we'll add the items to our Bonus Shelves for distribution.

The Food Pantry Bonus Shelves give our clients something extra to supplement the Capital Area Food Bank (CAFB)/USDA food in the bags we hand out. Since the CAFB doesn't supply non-food items, our pantry Bonus Shelves offer muchappreciated supplies for house, home and hygiene.

Remember, just like your home pantry, the Grace Church Food Pantry needs to be re-stocked regularly.

Items that are especially appreciated are:

- Diapers (all sizes up to pull-ups) and other kid-related items (baby powder, lotion, shampoo, etc.)
- Toiletries (shampoo, soap, lotions, toothbrushes—adult and child—and other dental care items, etc.)
- Cleaning supplies (liquid dish soap, sponges, laundry detergent, etc.)
- Non-perishable foods (dried beans, rice, cooking oil, corn meal, canned meats and fish, cereal, oatmeal, jams and jellies, etc.)


Hypothermia Shelter 2017

- Beginning November 27, we expanded Children's Chapel to the 11:15 a.m. service, and in both Children's chapel services, we welcome children up to 8 years old to attend. If you are a late-rising family or would simply prefer the 11:15 a.m. service, Children's Chapel will now be available for your children. Drop off begins at 11:00 a.m. and children will be returning to the service at the Peace.
- On Sunday, December 4, during both morning worship services, our children will receive a special visit from St. Nicholas. This is a wonderful way to introduce children to the origins of Santa Claus and receive a special treat.
- Sunday, December 11, at 5:00 p.m. is the annual presentation of the Christmas pageant, featuring the children and youth of this parish. Come and enjoy this Christmas tradition at Grace. It will certainly fill the nave with the sounds of Christmas!
- The last day of Sunday School for the year is December 18.


